# **Virtual Conservation Story Time Underway**



Make sure to watch Virtual Conservation Story Times Wednesdays at 10:00 a.m. We are hosting them in conjunction with the Mansfield/Richland County Public Library (MRCPL).

Many of the story times are posted on our <u>website</u> for a week, but some could not be recorded due to publishing guidelines. **February 24's story time will be read live on our <u>Facebook Page</u> at 10:00 a.m. and needs to be watched while live since it can't be recorded or saved.** 

Each Virtual Conservation Story Time provides Preschool to Second grade children with a different story, activities, and a book list related to the story's topic.

## **Only Rain Down the Drain**

Join us this year as we share tips on keeping stormwater drains clear through the theme of <u>Only Rain Down the Drain</u>.

Storm Drains and roadside ditches eventually lead to our inland lakes and the Ohio River.

Here are things we can do to make sure that there is "Only Rain Down the Drain":

- 1. Sweep up driveways and sidewalks instead of hosing them with water.
- 2. An outdoor hose can use up to 20 30 gallons of water per minute.
- 3. You will not have as many chemicals (antifreeze and oil just to name a couple) getting into the storm drains.



- 4. Antifreeze kills fish when it reaches streams or any body of water.
- 5. You will reduce (potentially contaminated) stormwater runoff.
- 6. Using less water allows it to stay underground or in reservoirs which helps preserve wildlife and saves water for future use.
- 7. Using a broom and dust pan instead will save water.

To help with the cleaning efforts and maintain the Black Fork River for years to come, the City of Shelby and rural community members will continue their efforts by filing a Joint Ditch Petition with the Richland County and Crawford County Commissioners February 24.
