Another important part of the evening is the public election for one Board of Supervisor seat. Details on how to vote appear below.

How to Vote For a Board Supervisor

An Election of a Board Supervisor of the Richland Soil and Water Conservation District will be held in accordance with Chapter 940.04 of the Ohio Revised Code. One (1) supervisor will be elected to a three-year term beginning January 2020.

<u>Board Supervisors</u> serve without pay. The Board of Supervisors create an annual and longterm plan of operation that protects the District's vision and participate in monthly board meetings, assist with programs and attend area and state meetings.

Residents or landowners, firms and corporations that own land or occupy land in Richland County and are 18 years of age or older may vote for supervisors. A non-resident landowner, firm or corporation must provide an affidavit of eligibility, which includes designation of a voting representative, prior to casting a ballot.

Absentee voting begins Thursday, October 17, 2019. You have two ways to vote via absentee ballot:

- Stop in our office Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and complete the <u>SEL-2 Form Request</u>
- Once the SEL-2 Form is complete, mail it or bring it to our office. Our address is 1495 W. Longview Avenue, Suite 205B, Mansfield, OH 44906.

Absentee ballot requests must be received at our office by October 31, 2019.

Completed absentee ballots must be received in our office by November 7, 2019, at 3:00 p.m.

You may also vote at the Annual Celebration on November 7, 2019, from 5:00 to 6:15 p.m.

Milkweed Seed Pod Collection

This is the first year we have raised <u>monarch butterflies</u> and we released our first monarch last week.If you haven't done this yourself, we strongly recommend it. It will bring an automatic smile to your face and is an instant stress-reliever!

Milkweed seed pods are starting to mature to the point where they can be harvested. Start scouting fields and if

pods appear slightly gray and are dried out they are ready to pick. Seeds inside should be brown before harvesting. Please remember, if you want to pick on private property, you need to ask for permission first.

Last year's massive statewide seed collection effort was spearheaded by the Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative (OPHI), which is working to get the word out about why monarch butterflies are disappearing and help partners create monarch habitat. The disappearance of milkweed, the only host plant for monarch caterpillars, across the U.S. has contributed to the 80% decline of the eastern monarch butterfly population over the last 20 years: <u>http://ow.ly/ncwE30fwsKC</u>

Collect the pods in a brown paper bag and drop them off at our office in the green and yellow container. During winter, the seeds will be removed from the pods and we will distribute them for planting. We support saving the Monarch Butterfly and the Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative!

Tech Corner

Today we are debuting a new section, Tech Corner. We receive great questions from citizens and contractors who work and build here in Richland County. When we get questions that we think will be of interest to you, we will share them in this section. Who knows, it may be a question you have, too!

Q: Why does it make a difference where and how water is discharged off my roof and downspouts?



A: When you apply for a <u>stormwater</u> permit for a structure, we may ask you to install gutters and downspouts. Whether or not we ask you to install them is determined by how much impervious surface (the size of the area that cannot absorb water, i.e. roofs, sidewalks and parking lots) that is created. Also, erosion can occur when rainwater comes off your roof and drips onto the ground. Did you know that one (1) inch of rain that falls over a one thousand (1000) square foot roof equates to six hundred twenty (620) gallons of water?! That's a lot of water!

We want to control the water so when it comes off the roof it does not cause any damage to you or your neighbor's property. We may also ask you to incorporate practices that will further reduce the potential for problems due to too much water or cause soil erosion. For instance, we may require that you cannot discharge your roof water any closer than thirty (30) feet from your property line or your downspouts discharge onto a splash block or install a rock bed at the end of your daylighted tile from the roof water runoff. All of these practices are put into place to control erosion and to hopefully avoid upset neighbors. Here are things we can do to make sure that there is "Only Rain Down the Drain":

Plant bare spots in your yard for these benefits:

- 1. Enhances aesthetics for your property.
- 2. Adds value to your home.
- 3. Provides habitat.
- 4. Reduces stormwater runoff.
- 5. Creates erosion control, reducing loss of soils in waterways.
- 6. Reduces evaporation and soil degradation.
- 7. Grass will help in filtering deposits and contaminates from the water before it goes into your stormwater system. There are a lot of stormwater systems that just drain directly to a river or tributary without any water treatment.

Here's the Dirt on Soil Testing



We have exciting news to share! After researching many options, we have selected a new vendor to work with for soil testing. Also, we now soil test for gardens, lawns, hobby farms and farms. Plus the cost has been reduced.

The other good news is that you still have time to have your soil tested before winter.

Why is soil testing important? Time and money may

be saved if the soil composition is known prior to planting. Knowing your soil's composition is the first step toward attaining healthy plants. If you over-apply nutrients, you run the risk of causing soil imbalance, adversely affecting the environment, contaminating water and harming aquatic life. It is estimated that each year around 24 billion tons of soil is lost due to erosion, which could be caused by unbalanced soil management.
